

Toyama City Eco-Future City Plan Overview



<Present condition of regional municipalities and their challenges> Regional cities are faced with dwindling populations, advanced aging of the local population, tight finances, growing administrative costs such as those for infrastructure maintenance and management, etc.

Toyama City presents a future vision of a regional city that addresses all these issues

1. Compact city centered on public transportation


Enhanced routes and schedules of the public transit; agglomeration of urban features in the city center and along the public transit network, etc.

2. Attractive high quality life for citizens

Enlivening local communities; safe and secure environment; nurturing social capital, etc.

3. Promoting industries to showcase the distinct features of the localities

Showcasing the unique traditional pharmaceutical industry; utilizing renewable energy; inviting new firms to open businesses locally, etc.



Strongly Bonded Community: Social Welfare



The proportion of the population under a social welfare scheme is small

- 4.14‰ for Toyama City (1,519 households; 1,733 individuals: as of Sept.
 2014) The lowest among the core cities
- 3.27‰ for Toyama Prefecture (as of Sept. 2014) The lowest in Japan
- National average 17.00‰ (MHLW Bulletin, Aug. 2014)

What factors are contributing to the low social security payout, rate?

- Hard-working, highly motivated local population
- Strong self-sustaining factors for living (index figures for savings, double-income households, home ownership, and disposable income are all high)
- Strong local connections (many three-generation households)



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Community Hubs and Liaisons: Local Government Offices



Approx. 98.9% of municipal residents live within a 2 km radius of the City's City Council buildings*
 Every school district has a community center (73 in total) serving as a base for local community activities and providing various civil services

City Council offices:

(1) One City Council building

(2) Six general administrative offices

(3) Seventy-three community centers; 80 locations total

Community centers:

There is almost one in every school district; staffed on a full-time basis, functioning as satellite offices of the City Council. Services provided include residence registration, issuance of residency, taxation and other certificates, as well as dissemination of information on municipal governance.

In addition, the centers function as community public halls to support various activities for the local population.

2-km area of Community General Support Centers



- Approx. 87.2% of municipal residents live within a 2 km radius of the Community General Support Centers
- There are a total of 32 centers in Toyama City, the highest number among the core cities in Japan. The centers are rolling out projects for arranging nursing care, in collaboration with local communities

Community General Support Center:

The Long-Term Care Insurance Act provides for the establishment of community general support centers for the purpose of improving public health, welfare and medical care for residents. They provide general consultations, support for preventing abuse, and nursing/ preventive care in a comprehensive manner. The centers are staffed with public health nurses, chief care managers and certified social workers, who liaise with one another to provide services and expertise.

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Community Activities: Socialization among senior citizens

Senior Citizens' Salon project

Toyama City supports local initiatives to establish a Senior Citizens' Salon to provide local elderly people with a place and opportunity to socialize with others in the community by enjoying meals, a cup of tea or hobbies. This initiative is expected to prevent active isolation of the elderly, give the elderly reasons to enjoy themselves, and strengthen community bonds.

(1) Kumano area "Wakatake Community House"

Opened April 2, 2014

Tea room, craft exhibition, group lunch, seminars on health and wellbeing, crime prevention, etc.



(2) Iwase area "Iwase Lively Salon Mattoccha"

Opened June 7, 2014

Tea room, *igo* chess games, group lunch, collaboration with local resident volunteers, to welcome tourists, etc.





Community Activities: Getting senior citizens out into the community



Developing a health & socialization-focused township

Kadokawa Nursing and Preventive Care Center, located in the city center, is positioned at the center of a pedestrian network area, where senior citizens and others may venture out and socialize in a safe, secure and comfortable environment.

Day Out with the Grandchildren project

This initiative encourages inter-generational communication and stronger family bonds, and increased opportunities for senior citizens to go out, by giving incentives in the form of a waiver of admission fees at certain facilities when senior citizens visit with their grandchildren.




Community Activities: Raising awareness of a clean and pleasant environment




Keep Our Toyama Clean project The project encourages citizens and local businesses to participate in clean-up initiatives to maintain Toyama as a clean and attractive city that the nation takes pride in. This provides local residents with the opportunity to raise awareness of the importance of a clean environment as well as developing community bonds.


